It is a time set aside to mourn the loss of our children and to renounce the forces of violence and fear that plague our nation today. The children can serve as ushers and greeters that Sunday. Prepare blue ribbons (blue=a symbol of hope) for the congregation to be distributed as they enter for worship. A Board is NOT the only option!

"Our mission statement calls us to mobilize women to act boldly on their faith in Jesus Christ." But does every unit need to be organized the same? Of course not! You may be organized using the board model, but if it's time for a change, you have choices. Actually, six different options are available. We know that "one size does not fit all!" We know that times have changed and maybe our unit organization might crave a change too. At our Spring Gathering in March, my conference, Suncoast, realized that the time for change is now. We knew that we wanted to continue as a conference and we needed to find a workable way. We recognized that our sisterhood is very important to each of us. A review of the models and a recommendation

from FL-BA SWO Vice President Lisa Klima helped us to decide that *Model D—co-leaders* might be a better fit for our group. This model has two elected or appointed leaders to coordinate ministries for the conference. A strength is that the model is the least formal and works for organizations that need a reformation. After some prayerful consideration, two women stepped up after evaluating their complementary gifts. We chose to elect the co-leaders and our current Secretary chose to continue her term. All were installed, and we will try this model for a year and evaluate at our 2020 Spring Gathering. We were blessed!

Why You Should Boycott Wendy's

The <u>Fair Food Program</u> is a unique partnership among farmers, farmworkers and retail food companies that ensures humane wages and working conditions for the workers who pick fruits and vegetables on participating farms. It harnesses the power of consumer demand to give farmworkers a voice in the decisions that affect their lives, and to eliminate the longstanding abuses that have plagued agriculture for generations.

- 80% of farmworker women are sexually harassed or assaulted
- 100 US farmworkers suffer serious lost-work-time injury every day
- The fatality rate for farmworkers is 7 times higher that the rate for all workers in private industry

The Fair Food Program (FFP) has been called "the best workplace-monitoring program" in the US in the New York Times, and "one of the great human rights success stories of our day" in the Washington Post, and has won widespread recognition for its unique effectiveness from a broad spectrum of human rights observers, from the United Nations to the White House." www.fairfoodprogram.org

Participating program partners include *Walmart, Whole Foods, Trader Joes, Giant, The Fresh Market, Subway, Burger King, Chipotle, McDonalds, Pizza Hut, Taco Bell & KFC.* Buyers agree to purchase covered produce only from Farms that meet the standards required by the Fair Food Code of Conduct.

What is the Code of Conduct? The Fair Food Code of Conduct was drafted by farmworkers who understood the harsh conditions in the fields and who asked that they:

- Not be the victims of forced labor, child labor, or violence.
- Earn at least minimum wage.
- Always be paid for the work they do.
- Go to work without being sexually harassed or verbally abused.
- Be able to report mistreatment or unsafe working conditions.
- Report those abuses without the fear of losing their job or worse.
- Have shade, clean drinking water, and bathrooms in the fields.
- Be allowed to use the bathroom and drink water while working.
- Be able to rest to prevent exhaustion and heat stroke.
- Be permitted to leave the fields when there is lightning, pesticide spraying, or other dangerous conditions.
- Be transported to work in safe vehicles.

People of Faith and Conscience are called to urge Wendy's to join the Fair Food Program (FFP). Wendy's is the last of the five major fast food corporations in the country to refuse to join the FFP. Wendy's has stopped buying tomatoes from Florida since the implementation of the FFP here. The University of Michigan has refused to renew their on-campus contract with Wendy's in solidarity with farmworkers.
